## High Harpist (Page 4)

Limerick harpist Siobhán Brady hopes to brake her own Guinness World Record (GWR) for the highest-altetude harp performance. With a team, she will travell to Tanzania to climb Mount Kilimanjaro, the highest mountain in Africa ( 5,895 meters above sea level). They will carry two 10 kg harps on the seven-day hike, in case one gets dameged. She'll play Ed Sheeran's 'Little Bird' on the summitt.

Her previous record was set in 2018 at the Singla Pass, India (over 4877 metres). So, what's the point of breaking her own record? Musican Desmond Gentle acheived the 2018 record with her. 'Ten days after we came back, Desmond died from thrombosis at the age of 69,' Siobhán says, 'but the week before he died, he said he wanted to do this on Kilimanjaro, so we're doing it in his memory.'

Funds raised will go to Cystic Fibrosis Ireland. Galway woman Caroline Heffernan will also be on the clime. She has lived with cystic fibrosis since the age of 13 and wants to encurage young people with CF to try and achieve the 'seemingly impossible'.

## Sudan Evacuation (Page 5)

Almost 200 Irish citizens and their families working in Sudan urjently needed to be evacuated in Aperil because of the outbreak of conflict in the country, with fighting going on day and night. Hospitals and banks were closed, so people couldn't get medickal aid or withdraw their money, and there were food shortages.

A team of Irish Army Ranger Wing troops and goverment officials traveled there to help them get out of the country.

Citizens were flown out on military flights organised by freindly countries. These were the lucky ones. But some - like Montasia Ismail, an Irish student studying there - took matters into their own hands and travelled by bus to neighburing countries like Egypt, a long and horendous journey through the dessert. Sometimes the buses broke down and the passengers had no food or water.

The fighting in Sudan began in the middle of April because of a power struggle between the two main factions of the military regime. Between them, they are destroying they're country - and we must pity the poor Sudanese people, many of whom, like the foreigners, are trying to get across the borders to safety.

Napoleone di Buonaparte was born on August 15, 1769, in the city of Ajaccio on the island of Corsica, off the $\qquad$ (1) of Italy. He changed his name to Napoleon Bonaparte when he was a young man in order to sound more French. His family were not well off and he was sent to military school in France at the age of ten. When he was $\qquad$ (2), he became an officer in the French army.

Napoleon was in Corsica during the French Revolution in the late 1780s and early 1790s. When he came back to Paris, he joined a rebel
$\qquad$ (3) called the Jacobins. He helped to drive the British out of the city of Toulon in 1793 and was $\qquad$ (4) in the army.

In 1796 he was put in charge of the French army in Italy when they were being $\qquad$ (5) by the Austrians. He was a brilliant general and soon won many $\qquad$ (6) by clever tactics. He drove the Austrians out of Italy and returned to France as a hero.

In 1799 Napoleon formed a new $\qquad$ (7) called the Consulate. There were to be three consuls in charge. Napoleon gave himself the title of First Consul and he became the leader of $\qquad$ (8).

He changed some French laws and set up the Napoleonic Code. The code said that people would get important government jobs only if they were good enough. In the $\qquad$ (9), these jobs went to people who were related to the rulers. He set up schools, built roads and improved business. However, he took away some of the rights which had been given to women after the Revolution. In 1804 Napoleon crowned himself $\qquad$ (10) of France.

The tallest tropical tree in the $\qquad$ (1) was discovered, climbed and measured in April 2019. It was found in the Danum Valley Conservation Area in Sabah, a Malaysian state on the $\qquad$ (2) of Borneo. The yellow meranti tree is 100.8 m tall and has been named Menara which is the Malaysian word for tower.

Yellow meranti forests in the area were laser scanned from the air in 2018. Scientists from English $\qquad$ (3) at Nottingham and Oxford built up 3D images of the treetops and picked out the really tall trees. However, the trees are measured the old-fashioned way someone must $\qquad$ (4) to the top and drop a measuring tape to the ground below.

Unding Jami, a research assistant with the South East Asia Rainforest Research Partnership, climbed to the top of Menara on January 6, 2019. The climb took three $\qquad$ (5) to complete and Unding had to battle strong winds and heavy rain as he approached the top. 'It was scary and windy, but honestly the view from the top was $\qquad$ (6). I don't know what to say other than it was very, very, very amazing,' Unding said.

Yellow meranti trees are a highly endangered species. They continue to be cut down in huge numbers in Malaysia with their $\qquad$ (7) often used to make moulds for pouring concrete and for plywood. This affects the environment as each tree is home to over 1,000 insects, $\qquad$ (8) and other plant species.

## Interesting Facts

The Danum Valley Conservation Area protects Borneo's $\qquad$ (9) orangutans, clouded leopards and forest elephants.

The tallest tree in the world at present is called Hyperion. It is a giant sequoia, is just over 115 m tall and is in Redwood National Park in $\qquad$ (10), USA.
