Ireland Into Playoffs

The Republic of Ireland are threw to the playoffs for the 2023 Women's World Cup.

They bet Finland 1-0 in Dublin last moth to secure a top-two finish in Group A. Lily Agg scored the wining goal after coming off the substitutes bench.

The draugh for the playoffs takes place on September 9, with the top two teams qualifying automatically for next year's tournament in Australia and New Zealand.

The third-placed team will go into an inter-confederation playoff against teems from other continants, including Cameroon, Chile and Thailand.

Ireland have never qualified for a major tournament, but hopes are high after a series of impressif performances.

Ireland's men's team play two UEFA Nations League matches this month. They play Scotland on September 24 and take on Armenia three days later.

Nasa hopes that its knew moon rocket will make its first flite into space this month. The 100-metre Space Launch System rocket is the most powerfull ever built by Nasa (National Aeronautics and Space Administration).

It will send a capsule containing test dummies into the orbit around the Moon – wich is also called lunar orbit.

This will be the third attempt at launching the rocket. The previous too were called off due to fuel and hydrogen leeks, forcing Nasa to take the rocket back into the garage for more testing.

Nasa's last attempt was on September 3, but they won't be able to try again until the end of September – or maybe even October. That's because there is a two-week blackout period were rocket launches are not allowed.

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Owls: Birds of Prey

Owls are birds of pray, which means that they kill other animals to survive. Their diet includes small mamals such as mice and shrews, plus frogs and birds.

Owls have superb sanses that help to make them grate hunters. They have extremely sharp eyesite and hearing which helps them to locate their prey even on dark, moonless nights. In fact, a barn owl's heering is so good that it can locate and capture its prey without ever seeing it!

Surpriseing their prey with silent flight is another key part of an owl's hunting success. This is achieved through special feathers that muffle the sound of air rushing over the owl's wings while in flight. This silent approach also allows the owl to listen for movement while in flight.

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


